REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES For the year ended 31 December 2016

The trustees present their annual report together with the financial statements of British Society for Neuroendocrinology (the CIO) for the year ended 31 December 2016. The trustees confirm that the Annual Report and financial statements of the CIO comply with the current statutory requirements, the requirements of the CIO's governing document and the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP), applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

During the year The British Society for Neuroendocrinology (charity registration number 1002114) transferred all of its assets and liabilities into British Society for Neuroendocrinology (the CIO), such that the unincorporated charity now forms part of the new CIO.

The financial statements combine the results of both the old charity and new CIO as if it were one entity because it meets the condition of a merger under FRS 102.

INTRODUCTION

The British Society for Neuroendocrinology ("the Society") is a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO), whose members are researchers, educators and students involved in the science of neuroendocrinology. The Society's charitable object is to advance education and research in neuroendocrinology for the public benefit. Neuroendocrinology covers the interplay between the endocrine and nervous systems that control so many important body processes, including behaviour, sex, fetal development, stress, obesity and the body clock.

The Society's activities aim to advance and promote the highest quality international research in this area with the ultimate aim of providing therapies for the many neuroendocrine diseases and disorders that may develop throughout the life course, and to develop methods to beneficially regulate normal neuroendocrine function in man and animals. As with most learned societies, the primary beneficiaries are the researchers, academics, educators and students worldwide who are involved in neuroendocrinology. Wider beneficiaries include the universities that employ the researchers, educators and students, and also the general public, who benefit from the improvements in scientific knowledge and medical therapeutics that result from this research.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The Society is a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO), which was registered as a CIO in 2015.

It is governed by a board of trustees. All new trustees are given, in the view of the trustees, sufficient training and have enough knowledge to control the Society's governance, strategy and operations effectively. Trustees are recruited from the research community, on the basis of achieving a broad range of knowledge and experience across the board of trustees.

The Trustees comprise of a President, General Secretary, Treasurer, Meetings Secretary, Membership Secretary, Journal Secretary, Communications Secretary, Clinical Liaison and Grants Panel Co-ordinator, plus additional members up to a maximum of fifteen. The Trustees are responsible for the business of the Society, but may form sub-committees where appropriate to oversee separate functions of the organisation. All sub-committees report back to the Trustees.

The trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit when reviewing the Society's aims and objectives and in planning activities.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The object of the Society is to promote research in neuroendocrinology. This is achieved by the following activities:

- an annual conference for members to share knowledge and ideas, techniques and experimental methodologies, and to promote research collaborations between members;
- the production of the monthly *Journal of Neuroendocrinology* which communicates original research and reviews of all aspects of neuroendocrine research to the scientific and medical communities;
- support for members with travel grants to attend national and international conferences, workshops and training courses;
- support for members with subsistence grants to visit and work in other laboratories in the UK and overseas;
- support for members with grants to enable undergraduate university students to carry out research in their laboratories during the summer vacation;
- support for members with grants to enable foreign researchers to visit their research groups;
- support for members to organise symposia or conferences which contain a significant neuroendocrine content;
- Publication of *Neuroendocrinology Briefings*, lay articles which aim to explain neuroendocrine mechanisms underlying key clinical conditions
- membership of the Royal Society of Biology and participation in its programmes to enhance public understanding of science and to inform the national curriculum on the teaching of biology in schools, and;
- membership of the International Neuroendocrine Federation which promotes world-wide communication between researchers in neuroendocrinology.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

During the year the Society's annual meeting was held in Glasgow in August 2016. The meeting attracted 104 delegates and featured symposia, poster sessions and a series of keynote speakers. The meeting was organised on behalf of the Society by the University of Glasgow and was provided with £11,076 of support by the Society.

Membership numbers increased by 62 to 286, the highest since 2012. Income from membership subscriptions was £13,657 (2015: £10,689).

The Society's monthly journal, the *Journal of Neuroendocrinology*, continued to flourish. Its 2016 impact factor (a measure of esteem in the academic community; published June 2017) was 3.47 (2015: 3.14). This puts it well into the top half of journals in its impact factor categories (55/138 (Endocrinology & Metabolism); 89/258 (Neurosciences)). The journal is managed and published on the Society's behalf by Wiley and continues to be the major source of income for the Society. 1071 pages were published in 2016 (860 in 2015). The Society received £198,936 from Wiley for its share of journal income in 2016 (£185,856 in 2015).

The Society continues to communicate the importance of neuroendocrinology in the public domain, and aims to further inform the public on topical neuroendocrine issues. In furtherance of this aim, the Society has a website, (<u>http://www.neuroendo.org.uk/Home.aspx</u>), the function of which is as both a portal for members and also as a user-friendly interface with the general public.

The Society is also involved in the Practical Biology (<u>http://www.practicalbiology.org</u>) website for schools, which provides biology projects that can be used by teachers to ensure that students experience practical biology work.

The Society's major expenditure is on grants in support of neuroendocrinology. During the year the Society awarded a total of £135,421 (2015: £93,982) in grants to individuals and a further £8,080 (2015: £Nil) to institutions.

SYMPOSIUM SUPPORT

The Society supported additional conferences and local meetings, in addition to the Society's own annual meeting, which had a focus on neuroendocrinology or contained specific symposia which the Society supported. Some of the support we provided in this scheme was to symposia that were selected specifically by the Journal of Neuroendocrinology. The total value of these grants awarded in 2016 was £11,030 (2015: £5,743).

CONFERENCE TRAVEL SUPPORT

Grants were awarded to 30 (2015: 59) members to enable them to go to international neuroendocrine conferences. The cost of these totalled £14,300 (2015: £22,850).

RESEARCH VISIT GRANTS

Members received grants for:

- visiting research labs around the world to pursue new avenues and/or learn new techniques for the projects; up to £5,000 is available per award for travel, accommodation and laboratory consumables for the project. During 2016, 8 grants were given, totalling £27,548 (2015: £22,850);
- hosting undergraduate student projects within their labs; approximately half of the money is a bursary for the undergraduate student and half is money for laboratory consumables for the project. During 2016, 18 grants were given, totalling £20,641 (2015: £16,579).

PROJECT SUPPORT GRANTS

14 (2015: 7) grants were given, totalling £67,682 (2015: £34,853).

GRANT TO THE PAN AMERICAN NEUROENDOCRINE SOCIETY

The Society made the first of three annual grants of \$10,000 (£8080) to assist in the formation and initial running of the new Pan American Neuroendocrine Society (PANS), in return for which PANS has adopted the *Journal of Neuroendocrinology* as its official journal and will promote the journal throughout the Americas.

POSTER PRIZES

Three poster prizes were awarded totalling £250.

FUNDRAISING ACTIVITIES

No direct fundraising activities have taken place in the year as the Society is reliant on member subscriptions and journal royalties to generate income to meet its objectives.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The Society had incoming resources for 2016 of £213,146 (2015: £197,607). Resources expended were £228,972 (2015: £198,318). The deficit of £15,826 (2015: £531) led to overall funds at the end of 2016 of £405,878 (2015: £421,704). This result is considered satisfactory in the current economic climate.

The main income relates to the *Journal of Neuroendocrinology*. This income has been fairly stable in recent years and is expected to remain so in at least the short-medium term future.

RESERVES POLICY

It is the Society's policy that unrestricted funds not presently committed or invested in tangible fixed assets should be maintained at the equivalent of 24 months' expenditure in order for the Society to continue pursuing its activities should there be a period of reduced income. Based on 2015 and 2016 expenditure, the required reserve is £427,110. At the end of 2016, the available reserves figure was £405,878, which is not considered to be sufficiently lower than the previous 24 months' expenditure to warrant significant and specific action to increase reserves.

INVESTMENT POLICY AND OBJECTIVES

Excess cash not required for immediate Society use to meet its objectives is invested in cash deposit accounts to minimise risk of loss to the Society while trying to achieve the best return available.

RISK MANAGEMENT

The trustees are aware of their duty to identify and review the risks to which the Society is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

The main financial risks derive from the journal and the annual meeting. The financial risk to the journal is minimised as far as possible by contracting publication to one of the world's largest journal publishers. Sufficient reserves are maintained to cover losses on the annual meeting.

During a risk review in 2014, the trustees identified risks derived from the Society not being incorporated and therefore not being a legal entity in its own right nor having limited liability. Steps were taken to incorporate as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) and this was successfully registered during 2015. The new CIO has taken over the membership, assets and liabilities from 1 January 2016 and the current unincorporated association has subsequently closed. The Society is now functioning as a CIO.

PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

Journal income is expected to remain stable in the coming years. The journal contract expires at the end of 2018 and the trustees are currently considering whether to renew the publishing contract or go to tender.

ADVISORY BOARD

The Society's constitution provides for an Advisory Board to maintain an arm's-length oversight of the Trustees on behalf of the members. The Board comprises, subject to ratification by members at the AGM, Professor Joe Herbert, Professor Stafford Lightman, Professor John Russell, Professor Jane Robinson and Professor John Morris.

The Advisory Board has reviewed the Trustees Annual Report and accounts and is pleased to recommend them to the members.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the year ended 31 December 2016

1. CHARITY INFORMATION

The British Society for Neuroendocrinology is a charity registered in England and Wales No. 1163115. It is CIO governed by a constitution. The CIO's principal address is: Moore Stephens LLP, 35 Calthorpe Road, Edgbaston, Birmingham, B15 1TS.

The object of the charity is to promote research in Neuroendocrinology.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014 and Financial Reporting standard applicable to United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and Charities Act 2011.

The trust constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

The accounts have been prepared on a going concern basis.

Reconciliation with previous generally accepted accounting practice

In preparing these accounts, the Trustees have considered whether in applying the accounting policies required by FRS 102 and the Charities SORP FRS 102 the restatement of comparative items was required.

No restatements were required.

Exemption from preparing a cash flow statement

Exemption has been taken from preparing a cash flow statement on the grounds that the charity qualifies as a small charity.

Incoming resources

All income is recognised once the CIO has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably.

Member subscriptions are recognised as income on the Statement of Financial Activities in the period in which they are due. Subscriptions are not refundable.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

Incoming resources (continued)

Royalties receivable for the publication of the journal are recognised as income on the Statement of Financial Activities. Royalty income is therefore accrued where royalties have yet to be received.

Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Grants awarded in the year, but not paid, are accrued as appropriate. Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year-end date are noted as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Prepayments and accrued income

Prepayments represent costs incurred in the current financial period where there will be future benefit to the charity in the next financial period and an appropriate apportionment of the cost can be reasonably calculated.

Accrued income is an appropriate provision of royalty income for the publication of journals and leaflets being received after the financial year end but relating to publications released before the financial year end.

Financial instruments

The CIO only has financial assets and liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

Out of pocket expenses incurred by the Trustees totalling £1,866 (2015: £144) awarded to ten of the Trustees were reimbursed during the year ended 31 December 2016. These out of pocket expenses were incurred in attending the committee meetings of the charity.

Under the asset transfer agreement, all the assets of The British Society for Neuroendocrinology (unincorporated) were transferred to British Society for Neuroendocrinology (CIO) with effect from 1 January 2016. British Society for Neuroendocrinology (CIO) also agreed to discharge the liabilities of The British Society for Neuroendocrinology as they fall due for payment.
